Some time ago Shaun found a slip rift in the floor of Boltby quarry. This was recently explored to reveal a small slip rift approximately 35ft deep, 2 to 4ft wide and 30ft long. The quarry face shows signs of water erosion and has three small caves in it (mentioned in previous minutes) so particular attention was paid to the far reaches of Shauns cave (now named Stone Lever Pot). After Ernie had pulled some rocks out Jerry was able to squeeze down a small phreatic tube and make a vocal link with the surface, a good find for the area. Well done Shaun.

RIFT POT

LOCATION: Marble Steps NGR: SD679769

GRADE: 4

ROUTE TO CAVE:

Park conveniently in Mason Gill Fell Lane. Follow the lane and cross the wall at the stile, head north for 250m. Rift Pot is the large shake hole with wood covering the entrance hole.

ACCESS:

Call at Masongill Farm follow the route indicated and adhere to the country code.

WARNING:

Although Rift Pot may appear to be a safe dry cave, in times of moderate rain the crawl between the first and second pitches becomes impassable, the water also backs up as it meets the physical constrictions caused by cavers bodies.

Two large blocks in succession provide natural anchor points, cross over holes in floor (old dig) to 'Y' hang over cylindrical shaft, there is a large quantity of loose material in the area of the first pitch, care is required. From the small chamber enter the crawl (it is advised to remove your S.R.T. equipment here and bag it). As you approach the second pitch a slightly deeper trench allows you to don your S.R.T. equipment. An initial anchor is back up to 'Y' hang at a constricted pitch head, a short 10m. descent lands on a ledge, here two route diverge.

Direct route

The first anchor of the traverse is used as back up to 'Y' hang, descend 10m. to ledge with re-belay 'Y' hang from opposite sides of the shaft. A fine free hanging descent through the roof of the Parthenon. Alternatively, a 'Y' hang re-belay in the roof is also available for those who crave aerial acrobatics.

Route 66

Traverse around the buttress of rock to 'Y' hang from opposite walls, a deviation after 10m. allows a superb descent through the roof of the Parthenon and the vastness of Coates Cavern.
