CAVING NEWS

A. MSG News

Fossdale Beck Cave has been revisited but despite visual confirmation of the point of connection of upper and lower caves a passable link was not achieved and more digging is needed. Another aven has been found with a seemingly large adjacent one (as yet unentered) guarded by 2 miniscule portals. A few minor prospects remain here.

West Scrafton Pot was the scene of two extensions together ... amounting to some 120'. On a further trip little progress was made but further scope for extensions was noted.

A weekend was spent in Lancaster/Easegill with the intention of digging in one place, surveying in another and revisiting a possibly undocumented part of the system. We discovered that such marathons require fit parties and we retired with half a dig done, no surveying and a visit to the threshhold of the unknown! Dovecote Cave in Garsdale is about 300' long in contrast to

P.U. - 501.

Swindale Head Cave had its prospects reduced by half when G.S. found the streamway closed down to an impenetrable bedding. The remaining prospect requires demolition of a slab.

Crackpot Cave was the scene of a dig championed by P. Stephenson. No progress was made so yourstruly laid on a cabaret by getting stuck in a small tube. Despite damage to my reputation I am now able to claim a genuine 5' extension - previously unentered!

Moking Hurth merits a little anecdote. Our story starts back on 17.6.70. when G.S. made the first (and only) through trip from Moking Pot. On this occasion the intrepid lone explorer entered the mud tube series whilst looking for the way out. The passage looked promising. Two years later (9.6.72.) a party set out to follow the footsteps and knee-prints of the 1955 party of UTCC who surveyed this passage and depicted it with an undefined end at a widening of the passage. The party, with the exception. of G.S. (of course!), were defeated at a squeeze some 150' before the end of the survey! G.S. now on another solo epic found trog marks corresponding to about 1 visit by 2 persons. The end of the survey was a small breakdown chamber filled to a depth of about 6' with jumbled boulders. On the right a narrow virgin rift led off and boulder clearing left a "possible?" squeeze deemed unwise to attempt solo,

24.10.72. was a special day in the log of MSG. Not only was M.H. pushed to its ultima thule but our Chairman was present (trying to boost his average to 1 trip per month). He excelled himself by passing the first squeeze and the entire party (i.e. both of us) reached the dig. After a rock session with a boulder we had made little impression on the squeeze but G.S. managed to get through anyway. The chief difficulty was that the squeeze emerged 6' above the floor of the rift and you had to do it head first (how do you get out?!). G.S. proceeded round a corner to a stal. blockage after a mere 30' of narrow passage. C.C. got stuck in the squeeze and was found imitating a bat (i.e. hanging upside down from the squeeze in the roof). After rendering assistance G.S. returned to hammer the squeeze before the passage effectively fizzled out. The stal. squeeze before the passage effectively fizzled out. The stal. squeeze was just possible with a little bone bending. Thus the secret of mud-tube inlet has been revealed - 55' of exceptionally tight and arduous squeezes.

Devotees of <u>Windegg</u> will be pleased to hear the level is still accessible. A recent trip suggested there is still scope for a bit of pottering, digging, squeezing, etc. The bypass to Creaking Boulder Cavern was opened up so there is now no excuse for not going down.

Kirkdale Cave was the scene of 2 hours abortive digging. Apart from one low priority prospect, exploration and survey are now complete and will be published in Nournal 6.

Whilst in the N.Y.M. area, MSG have assisted Ampleforth College V.S.U. in surveying Ashberry Windypit - the latest estimate is that this is well over 1000' long and still going.

B. Other News

Ampleforth College V.S.U. cavers have found a new windypit Blocd Windypit in Shallowdale estimated at over 60' deep and several hundred feet long.

Checking N.Y.M.sites in connection with the "Northern Caves" handbook led to a small extension to Motts Hole.

YURT have found several more small caves in <u>Mallerstang</u> in the area of their Summit Cave find. Two are over 100' long.

C.P.C. have found 500' of typical Yoredale cave - Tast Pasture Cave - the resurgence for Bishopdale Gavel Pots.

The press should never have been stopped! That is the stop press item in the last newsletter was all a mistake and Thackthwaite Cave has not been extended. Its length is probably around 3000' in all.

C. Foreign Caving News

ULSA have found a 2000' extension to Sleets Gill Cave, Littondale entitled Hypothermia passage it is very wet ending downstream in a sump and having a side passage almost connecting with the 'old' cave.
